2025

The past year was marked by escalating threats to democracy, human rights, and public safety. Across the United States and around the world, extremist movements grew more emboldened, more interconnected, and more willing to embrace political violence. From shootings and attacks targeting marginalized groups to organized intimidation campaigns against journalists, educators, public officials, and entire communities, the consequences of extremist ideology are no longer abstract; they are unfolding in real time.

Throughout the year, GPAHE served as a leading voice documenting and exposing the global far-right ecosystem that targets LGBTQ+ people, Jews, Muslims, immigrants, women, people of color, and other vulnerable communities. As extremist rhetoric increasingly moved from fringe spaces into mainstream politics, amplified by political leaders, media figures, and digital platforms, GPAHE worked to hold these actors accountable and shed light on the networks, narratives, and infrastructures driving these movements.

GPAHE also continued to expose the role of tech companies in accelerating democratic backsliding worldwide. And we hold them to account for the violence inspired by allowing harmful bigoted rhetoric targeting marginalized communities to flourish on their platforms.

This year, GPAHE expanded efforts to educate the public, media, and policymakers on the implementation of the authoritarian blueprint **Project 2025** and the rise of **Christian nationalism**—developments that threaten to dismantle human rights and deepen inequality under the banner of religious freedom. Our investigations have informed major media pieces, supported policymakers grappling with democratic backsliding, and helped communities understand how authoritarian movements organize, recruit, and radicalize.

As we face these intensifying threats, GPAHE remains at the forefront of exposing the dangers emerging from **extremist policies**, **political violence**, the **implementation** of Project 2025, the rise of **Christian Nationalism**, and the harmful bigoted rhetoric **targeting** marginalized communities. Our mission remains the same: to confront authoritarianism and the hate that fuels it.

Key Accomplishments





Exposing Trump's Role in Normalizing Extremism

This year, GPAHE closely tracked Donald Trump's continued embrace of far-right narratives, conspiracies, and prominent influencers, documenting how his rhetoric and policy agenda have fueled extremist movements at home and abroad. Trump's alignment with **Christian nationalist** and **authoritarian** frameworks embedded in **Project 2025**, along with his repeated use of language rooted in white nationalist ideologies such as the "**Great Replacement**," has helped normalize threats, harassment, and political violence.



Faith as a Weapon: Exposing Christian Nationalism

GPAHE released **Faith as a Weapon**, which examined how Christian nationalism is being used to justify attacks on LGBTQ+ rights, reproductive freedom, public education, and to dismantle human rights in the name of religion. Our report traced how religious rhetoric is deliberately weaponized by political actors and extremist movements to legitimize authoritarian policies and dehumanize targeted communities.



Tracking Extremist Influencers and Youth Radicalization

GPAHE intensified its monitoring of far-right influencers who play a central role in radicalizing young audiences. Our investigations documented how figures such as neo-Nazi **Nick Fuentes** operate within a shared ecosystem that blends **white nationalism**, **Christian nationalism**, **misogyny**, and conspiracy theories — often while maintaining proximity to mainstream political institutions and, increasingly, major media outlets. GPAHE's work highlighted how these actors normalize extremist ideas, recruit followers, and serve as gateways to more overtly violent movements.



The Push for “Remigration” around the world

GPAHE was the first to bring attention to how extremist forums, neo-Nazi networks, Christian nationalist groups, and the current administration are increasingly promoting the concept of “**remigration**,” a euphemism for ethnic cleansing originating in Austria and Germany, as a legitimate policy goal. Our research showed how this rhetoric has moved from white supremacist spaces into political mainstream discourse, posing an immediate danger to migrants and refugees.



Mapping the Global Far Right

GPAHE continued to expose the transnational nature of extremism in 2025 with our **Country Reports**. We exposed coordinated anti-women, anti-Muslim, neo-Nazi, anti-LGBTQ+, and anti-immigrant movements in **Ireland**, **Spain**, and **Colombia**. These reports made clear that today’s extremist movements function as global ecosystems, sharing messaging, tactics, and long-term political goals, while advancing white supremacist ideology and pushing discriminatory policies that undermine basic human rights, dignity, and equality



Holding Platforms Accountable for Enabling Extremism

GPAHE’s work showed how major social media and gaming platforms continue to enable extremist content despite public commitments to safety. Our 2025 investigations revealed how **Instagram’s** algorithms promote and monetize far-right and neo-Nazi content, allowing extremist influencers, conspiracy theorists, and hate groups to reach vast audiences with little resistance. These findings underscored how platform design choices actively contribute to radicalization and political violence, particularly among younger users.

Looking Ahead

2026

In 2026, we are facing serious challenges to our human rights and to the foundations of our democracy, and an escalating risk of political violence. These threats are not theoretical. Extremists like the pardoned Proud Boys are gearing up for the elections. And, they are laid out in **Project 2025**, an authoritarian agenda that Donald Trump and his allies are implementing with alarming speed through coordinated policy planning and a growing ecosystem of **extremist influencers** and **organizations**.

At the same time, far-right movements around the world are becoming more networked and more emboldened—trends reflected in a year marked by political violence, shootings, and targeted attacks linked to extremist ideologies. From transnational anti-LGBTQ+ campaigns and anti-immigrant disinformation to the normalization of neo-Nazi and Christian nationalist ideology, the warning signs are unmistakable.

To confront these threats, the GPAHE team is ready for 2026 and will continue our critical work pushing back against the far-right movements that dehumanize LGBTQ+ people and immigrants, dismantle rights from women and black people, and fuel antisemitic and anti-Muslim hate.



In 2026

- Intensify our investigations into those who would engage in political violence, especially around the upcoming elections;
- We will continue our **weekly investigations** into the implementation of Project 2025 and the network of organizations, donors, and figures driving this authoritarian plan;
- Deepen our exposition of **Christian nationalism** and its embedding in our government policies;
- Demand accountability for the amplification of hate and extremist content from recalcitrant social media platforms;
- Investigate how the **Trump administration** is advancing policies that dismantle women's rights, and trace the networks behind these efforts; and
- Advocate at all levels of government for policies that uphold civil and human rights and the freedoms guaranteed to all of us.

Our commitment remains clear: **GPAHE** will continue exposing and stopping the forces behind authoritarianism, hate and political violence.
